Dear Colleague:

The 28th National Organic Chemistry Symposium will be held on the Montana State University campus, June 19-23, 1983. The MSU Chemistry Department is pleased to be your host and wishes to welcome you enthusiastically to Bozeman. The scientific program is outstanding and every provision is being made for you to enjoy your stay in Bozeman.

For those of you not familiar with the Montana Rockies, let me point out a few of the exceptional natural attractions nearby and encourage you to combine a family vacation with attendance at the Symposium. Yellowstone Park, our most famous neighbor, is just 90 miles south of Bozeman. Its thermal springs, waterfalls, and animal life are spectacular. Glacier National Park, 250 miles to the north, features glaciers of course, high peaks, excellent backpacking and camping opportunities, and the fantastic Going-to-the-Sun Highway, an unsurpassed mountain drive across the Continental Divide. The Custer Battlefield is 150 miles east of Bozeman; the battle is re-enacted each anniversary in late June. Also of interest and within 100 miles of Bozeman are Gates of the Mountains, where the Missouri cuts through a vertical wall rock canyon; Headwaters State Park, where the Missouri is formed from three smaller streams; and the Lewis and Clark Caverns, a large limestone cave with a two hour walk-through tour. There are many more things to see and do; the area has vast National Forests with many public campgrounds, hiking and climbing opportunities, and some of the best fly-fishing in the world. Expect temperatures in late June to be cool $(50-60^{\circ})$ F daytime). Pack accordingly.

Transportation: Bozeman is relatively well served by Northwest, Frontier, and Western Airlines. There are five incoming 727/737 flights per day. Nevertheless, the accommodation of a large number of arrivals/departures on a particular day may require special arrangements. Montana Travel, Inc., a Bozeman travel service, is thoroughly experienced in handling this, and they will arrange extra sections on existing flights or initiate charter flights if the need develops. Although certainly you are free to make your own airline arrangements, it would be helpful if you used Montana Travel; in any case, please complete the air travel section of the registration request form.

Because of the particular attractions of the area, you might wish to consider driving to Bozeman, perhaps by rental car from Salt Lake City through Grand Teton and Yellowstone National Parks. Another interesting possibility is using Amtrak to reach Glacier National Park and driving in from there. Montana Travel, Inc. will be happy to help make arrangements (406-587-4448).

Accommodations: Dormitory housing will be available on campus starting Sunday in the Hedges Complex about 300 yards from the Student Union building where the lecture sessions will be held. The rates are: double room occupancy - \$7.50/person/night; single room occupancy - \$9.00/night. Linen, pillows, blankets and towels will be provided, but making beds is up to you. Family groups are, of course, welcome. If you plan to stay in the dorms, please include the full rent with your registration fee. Food service will be available in the dormitory cafeteria daily except Sunday. (Sunday, the Student Union will be open.) Meals can be purchased individually and will be priced as follows: breakfast \$2.25; lunch \$3.00; dinner \$4.00. Snacks will be available in the Union. Of course, there are a number of good restaurants in Bozeman; an annotated list will be provided in your registration packet.

Motel housing is available in the area (see accommodation list). Block reservations have been made at the Holiday Inn, Ramada Inn, Best Western, Thrifty Scot, Imperial 400, and Lewis and Clark Motels. These motels are at least one mile from campus; adequate shuttle service will be available. We urge you to make known your motel request early to ensure your first choice. A deposit of one night's stay should accompany your request and be included in the amount remitted.

Camping, recreational vehicle, and western vacation accommodations are also available and are included at the end of the motel list. Please let us know if you have any special housing requirements so that we can make appropriate arrangements.

Non-technical Program: The Local Committee hopes to bring a little Western flavor to the Symposium by having a buffalo barbecue on Wednesday evening, June 22, followed by Organic Division Night at the National Collegiate Rodeo Finals. A ticket to each of these events is included in the registration fee. Additional barbecue and rodeo tickets are available for family members and guests.

There will be mixers following the Monday and Tuesday evening sessions with complimentary beer/wine for registrants and their guests. Bar service and draft beer will be available in the dormitory prior to evening meals.

The University's excellent athletic facilities (e.g., swimming, tennis, racquetball, etc.) will be available for your use free of charge. The local golf courses at Valley View and Riverside Country Clubs will be available, as will the 3-theater cinema and the Museum of the Rockies which are located on campus close to the dorms.

Several sightseeing tours are scheduled for participants/guests during Symposium free hours and on the Friday following the Symposium. Prepayment is necessary. The afternoon tours will each take about 5 hours (1-6 pm) and are scheduled as follows:

Monday, June 20:

Scenic tour - east loop "To Paradise and Back" (Bridger Canyon, Shields River Valley, Wind Farm, Paradise Valley, Yellowstone River, Chico, and Trail Creek). Excellent diversity of scenery - big mountains, ranching history and modern development. \$7.50/person.

Trip to Historical Virginia City - a trip which allows you two hours to visit the original buildings of Virginia City. Here, the vigilantes formed to clean up the wild gold town. The town is filled with memorabilia of the Montana gold rush era of 1863 to 1880. \$7.50/person.

Day-long Yellowstone Park Loop Tour (see description below).

Tuesday, June 21:

Scenic tour - west loop "To the High Country" (Gallatin Canyon, Big Sky, Hebgen and Quake Lake, Madison and Jefferson Canyons). High country scenery of mountains, canyons, rivers, lakes, geology, ranching. \$7.50/person.

Trip to Historical Virginia City - repeated.

Day-long Yellowstone Park Loop Tour (see description below).

Friday, June 24:

Day-long Yellowstone Park Loop Tour. Fully equipped tour bus leaves Bozeman in morning, returns early evening. Tour of major park features includes Old Faithful, Lake, Fishing Bridge, Canyon, and Mammoth Hot Springs. Access to the park via Gallatin Canyon or Paradise Valley and opposite on return. Time required 10-11 hours. Meals are not included. \$12.50/person. These tours assume sufficient demand.

We at MSU all look forward to having you at the Symposium. Feel free to contact us (406-994-4801) if we can help work out your plans. Please help us by sending in your registration form early. We will acknowledge its receipt and your reservations as soon as possible. Remember registration by June 1 is required.


